Environmental Management Council (EMC)

EMC Background

When the Ulster County Department of the Environment was established in 2008, the Ulster County EMC was able to continue its primary role of reviewing and advising the County and local governments on environmental issues. In 2008, The Department of the Environment completed the County's first Environmental Plan which has been used as a management tool for multiple County departments' environmental activities. The EMC also began operating under the new Charter form of government in early 2009, which allowed for the EMC to continue providing essential networking and communication among the county's environmental commissions and boards.

Environmental Management Council

Fifteen of the twenty-four municipalities in Ulster County had active Environmental Council/Commissions in 2016 (See Exhibit A).

At the end of 2016 the membership of the Environmental Management Council Board included 10 town representatives, 4 at-large members and one ex-officio member for a current total of 15 members (See Exhibit A). Officers for the UC EMC for the 2016 year were nominated as follows: Chairperson – Dave Haldeman (by John Sansalone); Vice Chairperson – Cindy Lanzetta, (by John Sansalone); Secretary – Kristen Schara, (by Bill More). Throughout the year, attendance was excellent with a quorum at most meetings.

The goals of the Ulster County EMC are:

- To educate our members about environmental issues and the opportunities available to Towns through grants and other funding sources so that they can have a positive impact on the local environment
- To then educate our local Town boards (especially our Town supervisors) and Town citizens as to what is happening throughout the County and the ways they can seek to improve the local environment
- To interact with the County Department of the Environment (DOE), the County Energy and Environment committee, and the County Planning board
- To speak out on environmental issues
- To support environmental initiatives presented by the County Energy and Environment Committee
- To suggest to the legislature areas where we believe there could be legislative action
- To promote steps taken by Ulster County to protect our environment and make sure that the public is aware of these efforts

During 2016, the EMC hosted a few special presentations. These included:

- a. Walkkill Valley Land Trust
- b. Citizens Campaign for the Environment (regarding a ban on plastic bags)
- c. Maintaining our Nation's Largest Water Supply (updating the New York City water system)
- d. Beekeeping (importance of bees as pollinators, bee populations and the art of beekeeping)
- e. Food recycling

Members acted as liaisons between the EMC and the environmental municipal councils and executive branches. The Secretary of the EMC documented in detail the information that was exchanged at each meeting in minutes and then the members shared the minutes with their municipal councils and executive branches. This method proved to be a successful communication tool for the EMC.

Letters from the council:

To the Energy and Environment Committee supporting efforts to enact a ban on the use of plastic bags

To the U.S. Coast Guard addressing concerns about the proposed movement of oil from Albany to NYC via barge (including the number of berths, the threat to local economies particularly tourism and recreation, noise and light pollution, and the threat to water quality)

Omega Retreat: May 6th/7th

Attended by 9 members, 2 DOE staff, 2 County legislators, the Chair of the Kingston CAC, and our facilitator.

We discussed:

- The EMC's target population
- Ways to help the legislature
- Our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats to our environment
- We decided to work more closely with the legislature, our own CAC's, Town boards
- Discussed what the EMC would need in the future
- Established a near term to do list
- Listed emerging issues which we need to monitor or work on

Department of the Environment

The Department of the Environment (DOE) helped advance the county in the areas of sustainability, stormwater and natural resources.

Provided the Council with information on the following topics:

- The County's Green fleet
- Electric vehicle charging stations
- Climate Smart Communities and NYSERDA's clean energy grant proposals
- LED street lighting
- Solar installations both private and public as well as on landfills
- Updated information on resource and recovery including composting
- Waterways advisory council
- Foreclosed properties that are not buildable and the potential to preserve these lands
- Advised us of upcoming conferences and other environmental initiatives and grants
