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2	THE CHAIR: Okay, we are going to get
3	started.
4	Good evening. My name is Michael
5	Horodyski and I am the Chairman of the Ulster
6	County Development Agency. I would like to take
7	this opportunity to introduce you to John Morrow,
8	our Vice Chair, and Randall Leverett, a board
9	member, also members of the agency.
10	This evening we are holding a public
11	hearing to solicit comments to the Agency's
12	Uniform Tax Exemption Policy and certain other
13	policies of the agency. The purpose of this
14	public hearing is to provide the public with the
15	opportunity to submit comments to the Agency on
16	the Uniform Tax Exemption Policy, the PILOT
17	matrix, the Uniform Criteria for the Evaluation of
18	Projects, and the Local Labor Policy (the Agency's
19	policies). The comments received today at this
20	public hearing will be presented to the members of
21	the Ulster County Industrial Development Agency at
22	their next meeting. The next meeting of the
23	Ulster County Industrial Development Agency is
24	December 14th, 2016, at eight a.m. And, like all
25	meetings of the Agency, it is a meeting that is

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2	open to the general public.
3	We have made arrangements for a
4	stenographer to be present in order to accurately
5	make a record of public comments.
6	Again, the purpose of this hearing is to
7	solicit public comments on the Agency's policies.
8	The purpose of this hearing is not to discuss
9	local planning or zoning issues, or to debate the
10	general concept of whether the Agency should
11	provide tax incentives in connection with the
12	promotion of economic development in Ulster
13	County. The purpose is to discuss the specific
14	terms contained in the Agency's policies.
15	Further, we are not here to answer
16	questions; although, in the course of the hearing
17	we will consider questions if we have the
18	information to answer the questions and there is
19	sufficient time to consider such questions. We
20	have made arrangements to have the staff and
21	counsel of the Agency attend this hearing to be
22	available to answer questions if there is
23	sufficient time.
24	By way of background, copies of the
25	public hearing notice are available on the table

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2	with Chris. The notice was published in the Daily
3	Freeman. In addition, we sent copies of the
4	notice to the chief executive officer of each
5	village, town and school district in Ulster
6	County, and also to the County Executive of Ulster
7	County.
8	By way of operating rules, I would ask
9	that if you wish to make a public comment, please
10	raise your hand, approach the podium, and I will
11	call on you, and identify yourself for the record
12	and then make your comment. I ask that you keep
13	your comments to no more than five minutes.
14	Now, before formally beginning the public
15	hearing, I am going to suggest waiving the full
16	reading of the public hearing notice, unless there
17	is any objection, and instead request that the
18	full text be inserted into the public record.
19	(No response.)
20	THE CHAIR: And we will now open the
21	hearing at 7:02 for comments.
22	Neil.
23	MR. BETTEZ: Thank you for having this.
24	I know that I'd also like to I'm wondering
25	if we're going to be able to provide written

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2	comments. The Town Board would like to.
3	THE CHAIR: You're going to hear, as this
4	concludes, we are going to take written comments
5	up through December 9th, so this Friday.
6	MR. BETTEZ: Wow, that's fast. Okay.
7	THE CHAIR: It's been out there a while.
8	MR. BETTEZ: Yeah, no, I understand.
9	So I'm glad to see that, you know,
10	category five is still being discussed. You know
11	that it's a very controversial topic in New Paltz,
12	and so we have a lot of things to say about it. I
13	think the Town Board is going to be discussing it
14	some more.
15	It's very touchy. You know, the last
16	project that was proposed there were, you know,
17	different estimates for how much the costs for the
18	municipality would be versus the PILOT payments.
19	And, you know, so one of the concerns is that, you
20	know, the taxpayers would end up subsidizing this
21	when the benefits were spread throughout, you
22	know, the entire county.
23	We are interested in discussing the
24	payments. One idea would be a deviated PILOT
25	instead of a standard PILOT, so that we can make

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2	sure that the costs are fully covered for the
3	municipalities.
4	You know, the big concern that we have is
5	even under the highest you know, you've changed
6	some of the payments for the category five
7	currently. And when we just do like a calculation
8	for what we thought our costs were going to be for
9	Wilmore, even under the highest payment option we
10	still come up a little bit short for the costs.
11	So that's one of the suggestions that we have, a
12	deviated PILOT instead of a standard PILOT.
13	The other idea would be that this may be
14	a standard way to calculate those costs before the
15	projects are even proposed, because it seems like
16	now we end up talking about the merits of an
17	individual project. And those calculations for
18	what our costs versus our benefits would be might
19	change wildly, depending on how favorable people
20	look on each individual project. So we may
21	alleviate some of the arguments if we agree ahead
22	of time what those costs would be. And then we
23	could
24	THE CHAIR: Just remember, though, in New
25	Paltz it wasn't cost, it was assessed value. That

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2	was the driver.
3	MR. BETTEZ: So, you know, also we're not
4	opposed to myself, we are not opposed to, you
5	know, having projects like this in New Paltz. We
6	just wanted to make sure that the taxpayers don't
7	have to bear the burden for the project.
8	So that's it. But we'll be submitting
9	written comments.
10	THE CHAIR: We knew this was obviously a
11	hot topic in New Paltz and we expected certainly
12	to get some comments from you guys, so.
13	MR. BETTEZ: And we appreciate your
14	working with us on it. So thank you.
15	THE CHAIR: Getty?
16	MALE SPEAKER: I don't have any comments,
17	Mr. Chairman. I was just given a paper to sign.
18	THE CHAIR: Okay, no problem.
19	Mr. Jim Maloney.
20	MR. MALONEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
21	appreciate the time to be here to speak.
22	Hi. My name is Jim Maloney. I am
23	chairman of the Economic Development, Tourism and
24	Transportation Committee. I am an Ulster County
25	Legislator. I'm also the assessor for the Town of

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2	Ulster.
3	And I want to again commend the IDA for
4	taking this issue up. I fully understand, after
5	the last go-round in New Paltz, which Mr I
6	believe Supervisor
7	MR. BETTEZ: Yes.
8	MR. MALONEY: Yes. Described that there
9	is a new facet to it, that you do now contact the
10	local municipalities and seek their inputs, which
11	I think is a very, very positive evolvement in
12	this process. I look up and down the landscape in
13	the Town of Ulster, and believe me, some of the
14	most beautiful new buildings were done with the
15	assistance of the IDA.
16	Everyone looks and they think it's a
17	gift. It is not a gift. The Kirchhoff Medical
18	Building pays four dollars per square foot, which
19	is probably one of the highest taxes per square
20	foot in the Town of Ulster. So that, you know, if
21	anyone thinks it's a gift, it's not a gift. It's
22	assistance.
23	And you need that assistance in this
24	world to compete. And everyone should, you know,
25	know it's just it affects three taxing

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2	jurisdictions. I have some other people here that
3	it does not affect special districts, it does not
4	affect fire districts. They pay full value.
5	But again, thank you.
6	THE CHAIR: Thanks, Jim as always.
7	Anyone else?
8	(No response)
9	THE CHAIR: We're going to, just in the
10	event that somebody comes, I think it's about
11	7:07, so we'll keep this open until at least 7:20.
12	But I think in the meantime, Madam Stenographer,
13	we'll just take a brief pause.
14	(Recess taken from 7:07 p.m. to 7:15
15	p.m.)
16	THE CHAIR: We're going to go back on the
17	record quickly.
18	One thing that we removed from the
19	proposed UTEP, our Uniform Tax Exemption Policy
20	matrix, was workforce housing. And what I think
21	we're going to end up doing, based on some
22	comments we received only verbally, nothing
23	written yet, which we are hoping to get, is to
24	bring workforce housing back into an eligible
25	category under educational and workforce

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2	investment under our policy matrix. So that
3	bottom corner under the proposed is vacant as we
4	sit at this meeting. The expectation is that will
5	be repopulated with what was there in regards to
6	workforce housing.
7	Sorry.
8	(Recess taken from 7:16 p.m. to 7:20
9	p.m.).
10	THE CHAIR: We're going to go back on the
11	record at 7:20.
12	Again, is anybody else looking to speak?
13	We're happy to have you.
14	(No response.)
15	THE CHAIR: If not, I do want to note
16	that the Agency did receive written comments from
17	the Ellenville Central School District. And just
18	a quick synopsis of those comments were to include
19	the school district in any and all PILOT
20	discussions, and also provide them with UCIDA
21	rules when they're done. So those written
22	comments will be added to the public comments
23	received this evening and become part of the
24	public record.
25	In addition, the Agency will keep the
