Sustainable Materials Management: Helping Local Governments Advance Zero Waste Principles

The Local Government Initiative is a pilot designed to help local governments across the nation advance zero waste principles and associated strategies, by identifying ways to reduce material use upstream and better design existing source reduction, reuse and recycling programs to eliminate waste at end-of-life. This initiative provides an opportunity for participants, with assistance from EPA, to:

- consider how materials are managed in their jurisdiction,
- implement practices that will reduce overall materials use and waste in their communities, and
- inform the development of a new and improved suite of tools and resources supporting local governments, including a new measurement tool developed under EPA's SMM Program.



Reality Check - Garbage Doesn't Disappear At the Curb. No REALLY, it DOESN'T

2008 – 800 tons of garbage was going from New Paltz to a landfill 4 ½ hours away. Nearly 2500 gallons of diesel was being used for long haul transportation

One hundred and twenty (120) containers of mandated recyclable material had a 32 mile round trip to a MRF using nearly 720 gallons of diesel annually

40% of the waste stream is recoverable organics including food suitable for human and animal consumption or composting.

At 22.4 lbs of CO2 per gallon of diesel (www.eia.gov) 16,128 lbs of CO2 is created annually just to transport the Town's recyclables.

Series of Interactive Public Workshops Scheduled

- December 2011-Kick off meeting at the historic Mohonk Mountain House to hear their "Green Story".
- January 2012 First Interactive Workshop - 40 people attended.

March 2012 Second Interactive Workshop with Breakout sessions – 110 people in attendance. Key note speakers: Judith Enck, EPA and David Vitale, NYSDEC.



February 2017 - To date, volunteers have collected 24 trays of food and two carloads of baked goods - 365 pounds

May 2017 18 cases of sandwiches were donated - 325 pounds

UPDATE: The New Paltz Food Recovery Program has collected 21 tons of food and been twiced recognized by the EPA
