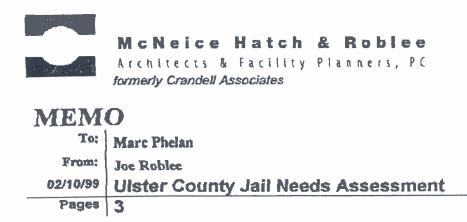

Meeting of the Special Committee on Jail Overcrowding

In attendance: Majority Leader Ward Todd, Chairman Daniel Alfonso, Legislators Fawn Tantillo, John Naccarato, Frank Dart and Joan Feldman; Harvey Sleight, Sheriff Richard Bockelmann, Jail Superintendent Fred Fister, Ed Brown, Herb Hekler, Dennis Doyle, Arlene Kerans, Bob Sudlow, Bob Milliken and Joe Roblee.

Meeting called to order at 2:00PM

Sheriff Bockelmann reported that he had written Richard Gaither of the NIC and requested that a mini-PONI program be held in Ulster County for members of the Jail Committee, as well as any other legislators. (This would be a shorter version of the program attended by Ulster County representatives in Colorado last fall). All legislators will be notified when meetings will be held.

Deputy County Planner Dennis Doyle led a discussion regarding the SEQRA process on the fifteen-acre parcel of land off Route 32 that's being considered as the jail site. He is being assisted in this by planner Dan Schuster and hopefully, by a jail consultant. Ulster County will be the lead agency with this process and it is hoped that the SEQRA might be completed by May 1, 1999. It was also noted that several members of the Jail Committee toured the proposed site earlier in the day. There was discussion that the site appears to suit our needs with natural buffers existing on all sides.

Chairman Todd introduced Joe Roblee of the firm of McNeice, Hatch and Roblee who made a presentation regarding the hiring of a jail consultant. Mr. Roblee said that he was presenting his report on behalf of Rosser International, a firm from Atlanta, Georgia and he described the scope of work for the project. The first track of the work would deal with issues related to the environmental review while the second track would help Ulster County with a Project Definition study. This will serve to define the size of the facility required and the number of beds. It will define in detail the functional requirements, room-by-room square footage requirements, preliminary layout and configuration and estimated costs. The purpose is to provide a basis for budgeting, public support and legislative approval. 2-16-99

Harvey Sleight indicated that another firm had submitted a proposal as well, but that their cost estimate was approximately \$100,000 higher than the proposal from Rosser, which totaled \$98,840.00.

Chairman Todd noted that several legislators have, over the years, been asking tha Sheriff Bockelmann if he could cover the cost for the consultant and the Sheriff indicated that he could. The jail study committee unanimously agreed to proceed as soon as possible with Rosser. The work could begin as soon as next week.

Harvey Sleight reported that a video-documentary on the existing jail was nearing completion. This will be available to be shown to civic groups, senior citizens and any other group wishing to learn more about our jail over-crowding problem. Chairman Alfonso requested that it be shown at the next full session of the County Legislature on March 11, 1999 and again at the Quarterly Department head meeting on March 24, 1999.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:40pm.
