Ulster County Department of Health Measles Outbreak Fact Sheet

⇒ <u>INCIDENT</u> – a case of measles has been confirmed within a school in Ulster County and UCDOH is collaborating with the NYS DOH, school officials and public and private health care entities to minimize the chances of contagion.

\Rightarrow **BACKGROUND**:

- Measles is a highly contagious viral disease that can be very serious.
- As a result of widespread immunization, measles virus does not circulate in the US. All reported cases of measles in the US have been brought in from other countries
- Measles is usually considered a childhood disease, however, it can be contracted at any age by a person who has not previously had the disease or have not been vaccinated.
- Unvaccinated individuals are 22 times more likely to get measles.
- Persons who have previously had measles are immune.

⇒ SYMPTOMS INCLUDE:

- A blotchy rash
- Fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red, water eyes (conjunctivitis)
- Feeling run down, achy
- Tiny white spots with bluish-white centers found inside the mouth

<u>Symptoms usually appear</u> in 10-12 days, although they may appear as early as 7 days or as late as 18 days.

- ⇒ <u>TRANSMISSION</u>: An individual is able to <u>transmit</u> measles from 4 days prior and 4 days after the onset of a rash.
- ⇒ <u>COMPLICATIONS</u> occur in up to 30% of all cases (especially younger than 5 older than 20). Can include: Pneumonia, Encephalitis, middle ear infection, diarrhea and seizures, miscarriage and birth defects.

- ⇒ **TREATMENT**: there is no specific treatment for measles.
- ⇒ <u>PREVENTION</u>: there is an effective vaccine for measles and in NYS all children enrolled in pre-K programs and schools are required to get immunized. Maintaining high levels of immunization in the community is critical to controlling the spread of measles.
 - *** Vaccinations can also be effective up to 72 hours after initial contact.
