Call to Order: 5:05 PM

OLD Business:

- Vote to Approve Minutes: A motion to approve the September and October minutes was made by Ms. Keegan, the September minutes were seconded by Dr. Sanchez, October minutes seconded by Ms. Rogan, and both were unanimously approved.
- <u>Slate of Officers:</u> The Board agreed to conduct nominations via e-vote. Board members will receive the e-vote from the Director's Office via email.
- 2025 Board Meeting Schedule: The Board agreed to continue the Tuesday, 5pm meetings. The Board cancelled the February meeting as the Public Health Director will not be in attendance. Any items needing a Board vote will be conducted by e-vote.
- New Board Members: There are currently 2 vacancies needing to be filled.
- Public Health Law Amendment 2024- Board of Health Appointments: A copy of an amendment to a Public Health Law regarding Board of Health Appointments was distributed for review (see attached). This amendment expands the physician requirement to included other medical titles such as Medical Assistant. The amendment was also adapted to be able to appoint medical care providers living in outside counties so long as they saw patients within the county's board they are serving on.

Department of Health (DOH) Report: Dr. Walter reported on the following:

• Dr. Walter Introduction: Dr. Walter formally introduced herself to the Board as the new Ulster County Public Health Director. Dr. Walter is a PhD Epidemiologist with an extensive background in public health. She has been shadowing staff over the past few months to gain a better understanding of the work they do.

• Division Updates:

Patient Services: A Nurse Practitioner and a Physician have been hired so the Department's STI and TB clinics can be reopened. The Institute for Family Health has been treating these patients as the Department did not have the staffing to accommodate. The Department is still in need of a Lab Tech but is actively interviewing. Clinics are projected to be up and running within the next several weeks. STI clinics are Mondays, 5-7 pm. TB clinic is once a month on the second Friday of the month.

Mercy Panicker has been hired as the new Director for Public Health Nursing Services. She has a master's degree in nursing and is currently working on her PhD. Ms. Panicker is working with her staff to bring back home visits for new mothers and babies. This is a onetime check in and not continuous care. Another nurse needs to be hired in order to begin these home visits. Currently conducting interviews.

In the process of expanding the UCDOH immunization clinic room to accommodate patients. The current room is small, and many patients come with other family members to appointments.

WIC is interviewing for two (2) Nutritionists to provide nutrition and breastfeeding education and to assist with clients receiving WIC benefits.

• Environmental Health Services: Receiving 2 grants this year, the Lead Rental Registry and the JUUL Settlement Money.

The Lead Rental Registry grant provides funding for lead inspections on pre 1978 rental units to ensure remediation occurs when needed, ultimately reducing childhood lead poisoning. The Department is currently working out the details of partnering with the City of Kingston on this initiative, as well as working out the details of the educational component to ensure both landlords and tenants are aware of this new program.

The JUUL Settlement money will provide a sum of money to the Department. The Department is exploring how to use these monies. There will be an educational component such as the "Check to Protect", in which parents are encouraged to check their child's backpack for vape products. There is a huge enforcement piece. The UC'Sheriff's Department has agreed to partner with UCDOH to go with the Health Department staff to

these vape inspections and confiscate any illegal vape products. The Health Department only has authority to inspect, instruct on removing, and fine but the product remains on premise. With Sheriff involvement, the products will be removed from the premises. Dr. Walter is working with other counties to advocate to the state to change their tobacco law(s) so it will allow for the rescinding of a NYS registration if a county deems it necessary not to permit a retailer due to a lack of adhering to local laws, selling to minors, and/or selling illegal vapes.

Medical Examiner: Hiring a third Deputy Medical Examiner for Medicolegal Investigations. The Department is working on transitioning from contracting with Westchester Medical Center for forensic pathology services to hiring a UCDOH Forensic Pathologist, as well as exploring the idea of establishing an Ulster County morgue.

The 2023/2024 stats were distributed to the Board for review (see attached). Dr. Walter is aiming to step-up data collection and create a dashboard that makes reading and following trends easier.

Currently, the Department is looking at starting two (2) fatality review boards, opioid and child fatality. Participation is limited to a core group, Mental Health, Sheriff, and DOH, as this information is sensitive and covered under Protected Health Information (PHI).

- Environmental Health Formal Hearings: An e-vote was conducted to uphold the Hearing Officer's recommendations for the following facilities:
 - Kingston Sunoco (Rte28)
 - Citgo Mart
 - Jahaan's Food Market
 - Saugerties Sunoco
 - New Paltz Snack Shop

The Board unanimously voted to uphold the recommendations at maximum penalty.

- Fee Schedule: UCDOH permit fees have not been updated for many years and after review of other counties' fee schedule it was determined that UC fee schedule is lower for certain identified permits. Dr. Walter presented the proposed increases to the Board (see attached). Ms. Keegan motioned to approve the increases, Ms. Rogan seconded, and it was unanimously approved.
- <u>Grants</u>: Dr. Walter has applied for two (2) grants and one (1) Letter of Interest. One (1) is a small environmental grant which would assist in expanding the engagement of DOH community events vs. just handing out pamphlets and manning a table. This grant would allow for the purchase of cooling towels, to be distributed at the Ulster County

Fair and would provide the opportunity to engage individuals and talk about heat vulnerability.

The second grant would partner with UC Emergency Management to collect data on respiratory health and hospitalizations related to asthma and other respiratory issues and map it to air quality. Ultimately, Dr. Walter would like an App created so individuals could combine their respiratory issues with current air quality to receive messages like "You should stay indoors today" or "Restrict strenuous activities".

The Letter of Interest would allow DOH to apply for the Connections into Primary Care grant to expand our new mom/baby home visits but with a focus on the mother, specifically women with gestational hypertension, diabetes, or preeclampsia. Providing the necessary equipment to manage their diagnosis and assisting with connecting them to ongoing primary care.

- Community Outreach Events: The Department is focusing on attending fewer events with lower attendance and attending those events with larger attendance and those that will provide a greater impact throughout the county's diverse geographical areas. The 2025 Community Events Calendar was distributed to the Board (see attached). Dr. Walter encouraged participation from the Board at these events as well as encouraging them to bring forth suggestions of events happening within their own communities that DOH should attend.
- "This is Public Health" Campaign: This campaign is geared to raising awareness of public health. DOH is working with a local artist to create lawn signs to be placed throughout the county to spark conversations and raise awareness of what public health encompasses. PSAs and billboards will also be utilized.
- Avian Flu: The CDC has started testing milk. This is being conducted at the processing plants. If there is a positive at a processing plant, then DOH will go to the farm to conduct further testing. Ulster County has approximately 400 cows and possibly 1 dairy farm (to be confirmed). Currently, there is no guidance from the State. Should we have positive tests in Ulster County, then UCDOH will rely on the Board for input on reasonable guidance for next steps.
- Paltz resident with a PhD in Biology from John Hopkins University.
 Mr. Zierler is a science communicator and educator with more than a dozen years as a research scientist working on cellular, molecular, and biochemical mechanisms of gene expression, microbial pathogenesis, and development. He has also been active in the Town and Village of New Paltz as an elected official and a volunteer on numerous environmental and planning boards, commissions, and committees.

Mr. Zierler is on the agenda to be approved for appointment at the February Legislative meeting.

Department of Health Medical Consultant Report: Dr. Carena reported on the following:

• COVID Update:

- a. Syndromic Trends document was distributed and reviewed with the Board (see attached).
- b. The COVID Wastewater Surveillance report was distributed to the Board (see attached).
- c. COVID hospitalizations were reported, one (1) in Ellenville Regional and seven (7) total in Hudson Valley Health Alliance, six (6) inpatient and one (1) in ICU.

Adjournment: Dr. Walter summarized the meeting and reviewed next steps. The Slate of Officers e-vote needs to be conducted, two (2) vacancies need to be filled, identify community events DOH should attend, and identify any grants for priority areas. A motion to adjourn was made by Dr. Sanchez, seconded by Ms. Rogan, and unanimously approved.

Introduced by M. of A. PAULIN, SAYEGH -- read once and referred to the Committee on Health -- recommitted to the Committee on Health in accordance with Assembly Rule 3, sec. 2 -- advanced to a third reading, passed by Assembly and delivered to the Senate, recalled from the Senate, vote reconsidered, bill amended, ordered reprinted, retaining its place on the order of third reading

AN ACT to amend the public health law, in relation to expanding eligibility for appointment to county boards of health and health services advisory boards

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivisions 1 and 2 of section 343 of the public health law are amended to read as follows:

- 1. The board of health of a county or part-county health district shall consist of seven members, one of whom shall be a member of the board of supervisors, selected by the board of supervisors, and at least [three] one of whom shall be [physicians] a physician licensed to practice in the state of New York, and two of whom shall be a physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant or any combination thereof licensed to practice in the state of New York, and in addition thereto, 10 each city which becomes a part of the county or part-county health district shall be entitled to one additional representative member on the board of health.
- 2. The members of the board of health of a county or part-county 14 health district shall be residents of the health district or a resident of a contiguous county who has a background in a health-related field and performs other substantial work within the health district associated with their health-related background.

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18 § 2. Subdivision 1 of section 357 of the public health law, as added 19 by chapter 55 of the laws of 1974, is amended and a new subdivision 7 is 20 added to read as follows:

EXPLANATION--Matter in italics (underscored) is new; matter in brackets [-] is old law to be omitted.

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1. In a county wherein the legislative body constitutes the board of 2 health of such county under and pursuant to the provisions of section three hundred fifty-six of this [article] title, the county shall provide for the appointment by the board of health of a health services advisory board consisting of nine members. [Two members] One member shall be [licensed physicians] a physician licensed to practice in the state of New York and one member shall be a physician, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant licensed to practice in the state of New The remaining members of the board shall be known as public members and shall be selected on the basis of their interest and knowledge regarding the health needs, resources and facilities of the community.

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7. Board members shall be residents of the county or a resident of a contiguous county who has a background in a health-related field and performs other substantial work within the county associated with their health-related background.

16 § 3. This act shall take effect immediately. 17





The most recent sample from Village of Saugerties on December 31, 2024 is higher when compared to New York State values.








Average intensity (population weighted) for all Ulster WWTP's over the last 12 months.




This figure shows predicted new in-patient hospital admissions due to COVID-19 for your county. Predictions are calculated from a generalized linear mixed model that fits wastewater data with a ten-day lag, log transformed active case numbers, along with several covariates including population over 50 years old, estimated asthma and cardiovascular disease rate for the county, and county social vulnerability from the CDC social vulnerability index.

The new model also includes a regional average for SARS-CoV-2 intensity detection for the past 90 days indicative of the overall state of transmission for a region. This model makes predictions with new data for future hospital admissions and provides uncertainty around the prediction in the form of the 95% confidence interval (the light grey and green band around the predictions). Past predictions are in blue with the current prediction in light green. The red line is actual hospital admissions from the Department of Health HERDS or Health Electronic Response System data These data are up-to-date for most counties. We will update these data and the models as new data are provided. Estimated new COVID-19 hospitalizations are predictions only and come with several uncertainties including whether new variants have arisen, what the current immunization state of the county is (including booster and bivalent shots or immunity from previous infection), and other factors not captured in the model such as intervention behaviors such as masking. Week to week predictions will vary in their accuracy and the width of the confidence interval around the prediction due to changes in the data. 
